## SMS SUMMER READING TRACK YOUR THINKING

<u>WHY?</u> Did you know that reading is one of the single most indicators for academic success? Through reading we learn empathy, we visit places we might not be able to see otherwise, and we learn so much about ourselves and others. Like with any skill, the more you read, the easier and more enjoyable it becomes. This summer, we want all of our students to continue reading and build their reading stamina.

<u>WHAT?</u> This summer, all Springfield students are required to read a minimum of 20 minutes, 3 times a week, for at least 8 weeks (more is encouraged!). Track your minutes and page numbers on the chart below (feel free to make additional pages, entries, or copies as needed), and choose one of the reflection prompts provided at the end of this packet to reflect on your thinking after every 3 sessions.

Students are <u>highly encouraged</u> to choose books from the 2020-2021 South Carolina Junior Book Award nominee list. These books have been highly recommended for middle grade readers by the state of South Carolina. In the event you are unable to obtain these books, other books are allowed to be substituted. If choosing books not on the SC Junior Book Award list, please be sure that the books are middle school appropriate titles that you have not yet read.
